Noteworthy Neighbours

This new column will provide a brief glimpse into the lives of people of Seeley's Bay – the tireless volunteers, the old-timers and the people who shine the light on our community from beyond its boundaries, such as James Raffan.

It's fair to say that love brought writer and geographer James Raffan to Seeley's Bay. Over 25 years ago, James and the object of his affection, Gail Simmons, drew circles around their respective communities of employment and discovered that the circles overlapped in Seeley's Bay. Before long they had purchased a property on Cranberry Lake. Twenty-two years later, when he took on a part time role as Executive Director of the Canadian Canoe Museum in Peterborough, he and Gail briefly contemplated moving. But after 48 hours of individual reflection they both realized they absolutely wanted to stay in this community. James says that Seeley's Bay is off the beaten track, but close to almost everything. He can quickly get to airports in Ottawa or Syracuse, and to meetings or connections in Toronto or Montreal by train, for his various speaking appearances and research trips. Yet at the same time, he can paddle in all directions, ski from his door, enjoy the unique geological landscape of the Frontenac Arch, and share life with wonderful neighbours here in 'The Bay'.

After spending 18 years as a professor at Queen's University, James became a full time author. His most recent book *Emperor of the North: Sir George Simpson and the Remarkable Story of the Hudson's Bay Company* (Harper Collins 2007) is a best seller and it is a great read. Just back from a project in Antarctica, James is now working on a book and film project that will take him to Siberia, and reflecting on the canoe as a symbol of reconciliation amongst First Nations, French and Englishspeaking communities in Canada.

James was awarded a Governor General's Award for Gallantry in 1968, he became a Fellow of the Royal Canadian Geographical Society in 1988, he was the Chair of the Arctic Institute of North America, he was awarded a Queen's Golden Jubilee Medal in 2002, and in 2009 he was awarded the Camsell Medal. In addition to his activities outside of our village, James also helps out by teaching tennis to young people here in the summer; he enthused about how Frost Fest is such a wonderful sign of community spirit, and he says the thing he is most excited about locally right now is the news that the hardware store will be reopening on the main street!
